St. Mary's Church

South Hartismere Benefice October 2023

As I sit in my tent in Derbyshire in August, listening to the pitter patter of the rain on the canvas, I wonder whether this heralds the end of summer and the start of autumn, although this summer has not been completely rain-free like some of our recent summers. To me, however, the beginnings of the end of summer starts when I sit and watch the combine harvester doing 'its thing' in the field opposite to my home, and I allow my attention, and gaze, to be temporarily disrupted as I look out of my study window. It is a welcome distraction from the computer screen and my GDPR and Data Protection training module detailing how unscrupulous people are trying to 'harvest' our personal data for ill-gotten gains.

I am no farmer; I am a city boy brought up in the suburbs of Norwich and the closest I came to agriculture was in history class where we studied books such as Jethro Tull's Horse Hoeing Husbandry (sic "A controversial but revolutionary method for seed planting and corn cultivation" or it was at the time). I do not speak therefore with any authority when I say that harvest is the culmination of perhaps a year long period of activity where the farmer has prepared and fertilised the ground, planted the seed, nurtured and fed the crop, and then gathered in the Harvest. Over the centuries farmers have understood more and with that have increased their yields. What is clear however, is that we ought to show our appreciation for the Harvest, and in our Church calendar, this is the time of the year in which we do it, when we say thank you to God (and to the farmers), and no matter how much we dislike the rain, it is needed for the whole cycle to be complete.

Harvest has parallels with many peoples' Christian journey. In the same way as that a harvest does not, and simply cannot, just happen without the sowing and reaping by the farmer, the same is true of my Christian beliefs. I learned these from a book, the bible, which I suspect at the time was possibly as controversial and revolutionary as they come. If the bible is a guide, I also need to be spiritually fed and nurtured by those who bring the stories (parables) in the bible to life and help us apply them to our own lives. We accept the "rainy days" as being a Christian does not mean it is all about blue skies and sunshine. As the centuries have gone by, Christians too have interpretated the teachings of Christ and given new meaning and brought hope to those that perhaps thought they were beyond the love and forgiveness of God.

I absolutely understand it when people say that they do not need to go to church to be a Christian, a church is just a building after all, but Jesus once said "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there among them" and that is why we gather together and grow together. As we enter a period of vacancy, Rev Julia has encouraged us to meet together and support each other, and I invite you to join us. However, wherever you are and whatever you chose, I believe that our Heavenly father knows everything about us, all our thoughts, words and deeds and He loves us. I guess in a way He harvests our data, but in a way that offers us rewards in heaven far greater than we can possibly imagine.

Update from Councillor Nikki Young Chair, Yaxley Parish Council

What a summer it has been, well a Summer akin to those I remember in the 60s and 70s. Holidays in the Lake District where it rained the whole time, whilst at home in North Norfolk it rained on and off throughout the Summer. We in East Anglia are as dry as Jordon usually, but this year has been more vintage and I for one have enjoyed it, far better than months of scorching heat!

We Councillors met with Cranswick representatives at our last Council meeting to discuss issues relating to the site's impact on the village. The smells emanating from Cranswick will be addressed by early next year, with the installation of new filtering systems, meeting new industry standards which will be something of a relief. The electrical engineering project lead will be reviewing the Cranswick car park lighting levels and gave his assurance that the installation of PIR lighting systems would be considered. This would hopefully ensure that the lights could be controlled and not on all through the night. We will be receiving progress updates.

Flytippers continue to unload mostly cardboard refuse at the bins by the bottle bank. MSDC do remove the excess refuse when notified. If you notice this kind of tipping, do please contact philip.c.freeman@btinternet.com and he will be in touch with MSDC to arrange its removal.

It has been noted that lorries are coming through the village presumably using Mellis Road as a shortcut from the A143. This road is not part of the County strategic HGV route. Furthermore, the Conrad and Drax vehicles should be using the A140 entrance and therefore have no need to use Mellis Road. If you have concerns relating to these vehicles, do please note any identifying company information and number plates and notify philip.c.freeman @btinternet.com who will contact the relevant companies.

Weeds, brambles, grass and hedges have been benefitting from the rain requiring a considerable amount of cutting and trimming. This operation has been costing the YPC in excess of £3500 already this year which incidentally is the amount of Precept monies we receive. This work has increased not just as a result of the weather but also as a result of the reduction in the works on verges and footpaths that were carried out by SCC Highways. The good news is that the hedges

in the churchyard have undergone extensive work to the delight of adjoining residents.

Suffolk Highways are conducting a consultation on the A140, we hope that the White Horse / Thorndon crossing difficulties could be addressed. Its definitely worth going to the SCC website and adding your views on this issue or any other relevant A140 matter.



I need a new car for work but I can't afford to buy a new one so I've been looking at second-hand options. I've heard so many horror stories about people buying cars that turn out to be faulty. I'm worried that I won't know what to check, especially as I know very little about cars. How can I make sure I don't buy a dud car?

First of all, where are you going to buy the car? If you're buying from a trader, choose a trustworthy one with an established name with a good reputation. Ideally, they will be part of a trade association or follow the industry's code of practice. If you're buying via an auction, this is much riskier as you'll have fewer legal protections like the right to returns or refunds so carefully read the terms and conditions before you bid.

If you buy from a private seller, there's a few extra steps to take. For instance, try to inspect the car at their home address so if something goes wrong later, you have a record of that. Make sure the car's details are correct by using the DVLA's free online vehicle information checker. You'll need the registration number, MOT test number, mileage and make/model of the car to do this check. Also, check the car's MOT history for free on gov.uk/get-vehicle-information-from-dvla.

Keep a copy of both these results (take a screenshot or download the information) as well as the original advert or description of the car. You might also consider getting a private history check to see if the car's been reported stolen, still has money owing on it, or has been in a serious crash. This will cost about £20.

Inspecting the car is crucial before buying. Ideally, do this during the day when it's not raining (scratches are harder to see on a wet car) and take it for a test drive for at least 15 minutes and on different types of road, if possible. Check you have the appropriate insurance for a test drive (either your own or the seller's policy might cover you).

Don't be afraid to haggle on the price, and only pay what you can afford. Make sure you get the original (not a photocopy) of the log book and valid MOT test certificate. Never buy a car without the log book.

Often, despite doing all these checks, you might find something wrong with the car after you've bought it. You may have a legal right to a repair, the cost of a repair or some money back but it's on a case-by-case basis. If something has gone wrong with your car and you need help, you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 0808 2231133.

Recipe Corner Courgette, Date and **Walnut Cake**

I have an allotment plot at Yaxley and it has been the most amazing year for courgettes. Here is a tried and tested courgette cake recipe that I would like to share with you. The dates allow less sugar input and the courgettes add fibre. It's practically good for vou!

You will need a 2lb lined loaf tin. Bake at 160 deg centigrade (fan) for 1 hour

Ingredients

2 large eggs 125ml Veg oil 70g soft brown sugar 350g coarsely grated courgette (wring out as much moisture using a tea towel before adding to mix) 1tsp vanilla essence 300g plain flour 2tsp cinnamon 14 tsp grated nutmeg ½ tsp bicarb soda ½ tsp baking powder 85g roughly chopped walnuts 140g chopped dates or sultanas

Method

In a large bowl whisk together the eggs, oil and sugar till a bit frothy. Then add courgette (already wrung in a cloth) and vanilla and mix well.

In a separate bowl combine all the dry ingredients, add a pinch of salt and then add it to the wet ingredients.

Fold and mix well and do the same with the fruit and walnuts.

It would be lovely to hear from other villagers who have favourite recipes to share. Perhaps we can make this a regular monthly feature.
